2021 proposed County budget focuses on strategic priorities

Commission Chairman Charlotte Nash's proposed 2021 budget totals \$1.91 billion, up 3.7 percent from 2020, and consists of \$1.47 billion in operating funds and \$441 million for capital improvements.

Nash tightened parts of the budget to create flexibility to respond to COVID-19 and included additional funding for the Gwinnett Public Health Department.

The budget funds transportation projects, two new parks in underserved areas, new positions in Elections, Transportation, and IT, and measures to address homelessness. Funding is included for the new Gwinnett Entrepreneur Center and Water Tower innovation center.

Because of leadership changes across County government, Nash also provided a reserve fund to allow the Board to decide the initiatives they deem most important.

The proposed 2021 budget resolution is available at **GwinnettCounty.com**. Residents can comment at a public hearing December 9 and on the County's website through December 31. Commissioners will consider the budget proposal January 5.

Senate runoff set for January 5

The runoff for Georgia's U.S. Senate seats and the Public Service Commissioner will be on January 5. Advance Voting runs December 14 through 31 at multiple locations, with the exception of December 24 and 25. Entrepreneur Center set to open next year

Georgia Gwinnett College will operate and staff the Gwinnett Entrepreneur Center under an agreement recently approved by the Board of Commissioners. The County's Economic Development division has already been working with the college to develop an operational and management plan. The center, located in Lawrenceville, will provide guidance and support for new businesses in Gwinnett and is set to open next year.

Conserve water at home

Gwinnett County gets all its water from Lake Lanier. With one water source for more than 900,000 people, water conservation is extremely important for our county, even in times of frequent rain. The best place to start making important changes is at home.

Here are some easy changes you can make to save water in your home:

- Turn off the faucet when brushing your teeth or washing your hands
- Don't leave the water running when washing dishes
- Thaw frozen foods in the refrigerator or in a bowl of water, rather than under running water
- · Only wash full loads of clothes and dishes
- · Check for leaks often and repair them guickly

COUNTY OFFICES CLOSED FOR HOLIDAYS

All Gwinnett County government offices, with the exception of those operations required for the comfort and safety of residents, will be closed Thursday, December 24 and Friday, December 25 for Christmas and reopen on Monday, December 28. Offices will also be closed Friday, January 1 for the New Year's Day holiday and reopen Monday, January 4. A Magistrate Court judge will be available at the Gwinnett County Detention Center on both holidays. Christmas and New Year's Day are trash and recycling holidays in unincorporated Gwinnett County this year, so collections will be delayed one day for the rest of the week. Emissions required for 1997 – 2018 model years

For 2021, all gasoline-powered and light-duty trucks 8,500 pounds or less with the model years 1997 through 2018 reguire an emissions test to register and renew. PUBLIC SAFETY

Prevent fire hazards during the holidays

Winter holidays are a time for festive décor and celebration. But the holidays can also mean a greater risk for fire. More than one-third of home decoration fires are started by candles. More than 40 percent of decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source.

Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and firesafe holiday season:

- · Blow out candles and turn off holiday lights before leaving the room or going to bed
- · Choose flame resistant or flame retardant decorations
- Replace worn or broken strings of lights
- Use clips not nails to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged
- · Test your smoke alarms, and tell guests about your home fire escape plan
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles
- Keep matches and lighters away from children
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop
- Ask smokers to smoke outside and provide large, deep ashtrays

Courthouse expansion close to completion

A \$75 million expansion of the Gwinnett Justice and Administration Center is set for completion by the end of the year. The courthouse expansion project includes a four-story, 180,000-square-foot courthouse addition and a 1,450-space parking deck, which opened in 2019 and provides almost double the number of spaces as the old deck. The new courthouse facilities will provide space for a jury assembly room, holding cells, workspace for the District Attorney, mediation rooms, and up to 14 additional courtrooms, although not all the courtrooms will be needed immediately.

When GJAC was built in 1988, the Gwinnett court system had five superior court judges, three state court judges, a parttime magistrate judge, and a probate court judge. Now, the County has 10 superior court judges, six state court judges, a full-time magistrate plus six associate magistrates, a chief probate judge, and an associate probate judge. Gwinnett's population was about 300,000 when GJAC opened. It is expected to reach more than 1.5 million in 2040.

Gwinnett County Public Library has a new early education initiative called Kindergarten, Here We Come! to help parents and caregivers prepare their young children to not only be ready for school, but to excel from the very start.

Each week the library features virtual events like letter camps and live story times as well as a revamped reading and activity programs. Parents can earn badges by logging reading minutes, doing activities designed to build early learning skills for their child, and leaving reviews – all while building a record of their child's accomplishments. Board adopts new water and water sewer rate structure, issues bonds for system improvements

The Gwinnett County Board of Commissioners recently approved a water and sewer rate resolution that sets rates for the next decade with planned gradual increases. The rate resolution will ensure funding to make needed investments in improvements, as well as for maintenance and operations. The new rate structure will repay bonds to finance these investment projects.

The new rates will increase water and sewer rates for usage every other year from 2021 to 2031. By 2031, the rate increases add up to an additional \$1.38 per 1,000 gallons water and \$2.27 per 1,000 gallons sewer. The monthly sewer base charge will increase from \$5 to \$7.50 in 2023 to keep up with rising costs.
