Proposed 2025 budget totals \$2.65 billion

Gwinnett County Chairwoman Nicole Love Hendrickson's proposed budget for 2025 totals \$2.65 billion. The proposal consists of a \$2.1 billion operating budget, which funds everyday expenses such as employee salaries, benefits, equipment, and repairs, and a \$542 million capital improvements budget, which includes funding from the County's Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax program.

New initiatives funded by the operating budget include redevelopment and small area plan studies, enhancements to E911 communications, and resident workforce development. The capital budget will pay for parks, roads, and libraries.

To qualify, the home must be located within Gwinnett County and should not exceed \$349,000 for an existing home or \$410,000 for new construction. TAX COMMISSIONER

Emissions are required for 2001 – 2022 model cars

For 2025, all gasoline-powered and light-duty trucks (weighing 8,500 pounds or less) with model years 2001 through 2022 must undergo emissions testing for registration and renewal. For many families, holiday preparations start with decorating, but it's easy to overlook potential fire hazards. Almost one-third of home Christmas tree fires are caused by electrical problems. Keep your family safe this holiday season with these safety tips:

- Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched
- Position the tree at least three feet away from any heat source
- Replace any worn or broken light strings and loose bulb connections
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree

Visit the new Western Gwinnett Pathway

Gwinnett officials will unveil a new segment of the Western Gwinnett Pathway, spanning 5 miles between Rogers Bridge Road and Suwanee Dam Road. As a part of the 2018 Gwinnett Countywide Trails Master Plan, the pathway — with the vision to connect the Loop Trail — will extend 17 miles, connecting Shorty Howell Park, the Gwinnett Place Mall area, the Gas South District, and the cities of Duluth and Suwanee. Approximately \$7 million of the total \$14 million project was funded by the County's SPLOST program.

Test your home for radon

Is your home safe from dangerous levels of radon? This invisible, odorless, and tasteless radioactive gas is the second-leading cause of lung cancer in the United States, causing more than 21,000 deaths each year. Learn if radon is present in your home with a test kit from UGA Extension Gwinnett. The affordable and easy-to-use kit should be hung in the lowest lived-in part of your home, such as the basement or first floor, for three to seven days.
