Behavioral Health Unit featured in Suffering in Silence: Mental Health Townhall



District 3 Commissioner Jasper Watkins III hosted a town hall to raise awareness of the mental health crisis and shine a light on local resources available to residents.

Sgt. David Smith provided a brief update on the recent school shooting at Apalachee High School in Winder. Sgt. Smith also provided information on accessing the Behavioral Health Unit and noted its 98 percent jail diversion rate.

Commissioner Watkins is advocating for the addition of a social worker to the Behavioral Health Unit and for the creation of a community dashboard to provide residents with access to essential resources.

Local faith-based organizations partner with Gwinnett Police for National Faith & Blue

- 4. Friday, October 11 from 5:00pm to 7:00pm: North Precinct hosts a community event at Buford Church of God
- Saturday, October 12 from 9:30am to 12:30pm: Central Precinct hosts a Cops, Games, and Cones event at Cross Pointe Church
- 6. Saturday, October 12 from 11:00am to 2:00pm: East Precinct hosts a community cookout at Lifeway Church
- 7. **Sunday, October 13 from 3:00pm to 5:00pm:** West Precinct hosts a softball game at Best Friend Park in partnership with Universal Church
- 8. **Monday, October 14 from 10:00am to noon**: Bay Creek Precinct hosts a food, household, and personal care items donation event to support the Southeast Gwinnett Cooperative Ministry

Families enjoy fully immersive experience at Gwinnett's Public Safety Fall Festival

We welcomed more than 4,000 residents and friends to Coolray Field for the 15th annual Public Safety Fall Festival.

The event engaged all senses with sights, sounds, smells, tastes, and tactile experiences. Families participated in hands-on exhibits to learn safety measures. Specialized units provided life-saving resources and live demonstrations. The police motorcycle rodeo featured revving engines, screeching tires, and the clinking of metal. Car enthusiasts reveled in a show of more than 160 classic cars, all meticulously restored. A free fun zone with an amusement ride, bounce houses, face painting, and games delighted children, while food trucks offered comfort foods and international cuisine.



Officers from the Southeastern United States and as far as Brazil attended the inaugural Peach State Motorcycle Rodeo, held alongside the festival, to hone their riding skills. The competition showcased motorcycle skills, with officers navigating courses named Toot Suite, King Cowboy, The Banjo, Dawg House, a speed course, Peach Brawl, Last Man Standing, and Slow Race.

First-time exhibitor Loretta Malcolm said, "The Public Safety Fall Festival was incredible! Right from the start, it was clear that we were in the hands of a dedicated team eager to create an unforgettable experience. The behind-the-scenes creativity, professionalism, and relentless effort made a significant impact."

Gwinnett County Police Headquarters is getting an upgrade

The County will use Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax funds for the redesign of our Gwinnett Police headquarters. The upgrades will address current and future space requirements, consolidating offsite teams and sections into a single facility. Originally built in 1977, the existing headquarters was expanded in 1988 and has undergone several reconfigurations over the years to adapt to the evolving needs of the county and the department.

Precision Planning Inc. was awarded a \$5.8 million contract for design and construction, funded by SPLOST. Construction on the project, totaling approximately \$86 million, is slated to begin in 2026. To learn more about how your pennies work in Gwinnett, visit GwinnettSPLOST.com.



Learn how to defend yourself in an active violence situation

An active shooter is an individual who is engaged in killing, or attempting to kill, people in a confined and populated area. Active shooter incidents are often unpredictable and evolve quickly.

Gwinnett Police is now offering an active violence course to individuals. The course outlines the importance of situational awareness and the concepts RUN, HIDE, FIGHT and AVOID, DENY, DEFEND. The course encourages participants to think about different ways to improvise to protect themselves if an active violence situation occurs and what to do after police officers arrive. These concepts will be learned in a classroom setting and will not be physical scenarios

Registration is required to participate, and seating is limited. Youth who plan to attend must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. Residents are prohibited from bringing their own weapons to class. All classes start promptly at 6:30pm.
